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## 1.0 INTRODUCTION


The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has conducted studies to evaluate and document the proposed improvements to Interstate 75 (I-75) from south of Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to County Road (CR) 54 in Pasco County. A Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study was conducted for the I-75 segment from south of Fowler Avenue to south of SR 56 in Hillsborough and Pasco Counties, Florida. A Design Change Reevaluation has been approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for the remaining I-75 segment from south of SR 56 to CR 54 in Pasco County. The Reevaluation Study compared and documented the new approved design concepts to those contained in the I-75 PD&E Study that was approved by the FHWA on November 27, 2000. The combined length of these studies was approximately 13.9 miles. Figure 1 indicates the limits of the PD&E and Reevaluation Studies.

The existing facility from south of Fowler Avenue to south of SR 56 is typically a four-lane limited access highway. This study evaluated six-lane and six-lane with auxiliary lanes typical section alternatives and a No-Build Alternative.

In compliance with state and federal rules, regulations and policies, a Public Involvement Program was developed in February 2002 and carried out as an integral part of the I-75 PD&E Study. Public involvement was accomplished during the PD&E Study to keep appropriate agencies, public officials, property owners, and interested citizens informed and to ensure project compliance with local and regional transportation plans. The FDOT has conducted an interagency coordination and consultation effort, and public participation process. This document describes the following components: Advance Notification, Elected Officials/Agency Kick-off Meeting, the Public Hearing, and comments received.

## 2.0 ADVANCE NOTIFICATION

The FDOT initiated early project coordination on January 22, 2002, by distribution of an Advance Notification (AN) Package to the Florida State Clearinghouse, Office of the Governor, Tallahassee, Florida, in accordance with Executive Order 83-150. The FDOT received notification that the Clearinghouse received the AN and forwarded the package to the appropriate agencies. The agencies or government entities listed below received an AN. An (\*) indicates those agencies that responded to the AN. Appendix A contains a copy of the Advance Notification package.

The Florida Department of Community Affairs indicated in a letter dated March 29, 2002 that the project is consistent with the Florida Coastal Management Program. Summaries of the comments from the agencies that responded to the AN are provided below.

#### **Federal Aviation Administration**

**Comment:** The Federal Aviation Administration indicated in a letter dated February 12, 2002 that the "FAA interposes no objection with this proposal provided navigational airspace is not impacted."

## Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Southwest District

Comment: The FDEP indicated in a letter dated March 1, 2002 that the funding for the Federal-Aid action and PD&E Study is consistent with the FDEP's authorities in the Coastal Management Program. The project will require an Environmental Resource Permit. A sovereign submerged lands authorization(s) (issuance/modification of a public easement) may also be required if the expanded right-of-way crossings of creek and wetland areas are determined to be state-owned submerged lands. The FDEP recommends that a binding wetland jurisdictional determination be obtained prior to any further planning. Early coordination with SWFWMD regulatory staff may help prevent future permitting problems. The public conservation and recreation lands located adjacent to the interstate and in the vicinity of the proposed project have been targeted for preservation by Hillsborough County,

SWFWMD and the state. The FDEP requested that a trail underpass at the I-75 over the Hillsborough River be evaluated.

**Response:** The Hillsborough River Bridge is expected to be widened and not replaced. The existing profile of the bridge and the design high water of the Hillsborough River provide for limited vertical and horizontal clearances. These constraints preclude the development of an underpass at these locations. The required permits and authorizations will be obtained during the design phase of the project.

## Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Office of Environmental Services

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission indicated in a letter dated March 7, 2002 a concern with the further fragmentation of wildlife habitat; impacts to wetland and riparian systems; direct, secondary and cumulative impacts to listed species; the need for supplemental wildlife surveys; and adequate mitigation for wetland and listed species habitat impacts. The selected project alignment should avoid impacts to listed species. To compensate for impacts to wetlands and listed species habitat, the FFWCC supports mitigation that establishes or maintains habitat connectivity within the study area and adjacent natural areas. Suitable wildlife undercrossings should be incorporated with appropriate bridge designs at the Hillsborough River, Cypress Creek, Trout Creek, and Cowhouse Creek wetland crossings.

**Response**: As with the Hillsborough River Bridge, these bridges are expected to be widened and not replaced. The existing profile of the bridges and the design high water of these water bodies provide for limited vertical and horizontal clearances. These constraints preclude the development of underpasses at these locations.

#### Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council

**Comment:** The Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council (TBRPC) indicated in a letter dated March 11, 2002 that the project was reviewed for consistency with the TBRPC's Strategic Regional Policy Plan. The project may impact Natural Resources of Regional Significance. It must be determined that any proposed impacts to regionally-significant natural resources are of overriding public interest, and mitigation should be required according to the ratios set forth therein.

**Response:** The FDOT will work with the appropriate regulatory agencies to ensure impacts to natural resources are avoided, minimized or mitigated.

## 3.0 ELECTED OFFICIALS/AGENCY KICK-OFF MEETING

A Public Officials/Agency Kickoff Meeting for the I-75 PD&E Study was held on Wednesday, February 13, 2002 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the FDOT, District Seven Office, 11201 N. McKinley Drive, Tampa, Florida.

The meeting format was open and informal. This meeting was held to inform elected officials and local, state, regional, and federal agencies of the project and to obtain specific data on matters pertinent to the project.

Seventeen agency representatives including the City of Temple Terrace, the City of Tampa, Temple Terrace Police Department, Hillsborough County, the Hillsborough County Metropolitan Planning Organization, and the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, attended the kickoff meeting. No written comments were received from the agencies during the kickoff meeting.

## 4.0 AGENCY COORDINATION AND COMMENTS

On April 16, 2003 and on June 10, 2003, the FDOT met with Hillsborough County and Pasco County representatives, respectively to discuss the project. Both counties were in concurrence with the proposed improvements.

Throughout the PD&E process the FDOT received comments from local and state agencies. In a letter dated November 25, 2003, the Florida Department of State Division of Historical Resources indicated that the Cultural Resource Assessment survey prepared for this project is complete and sufficient in accordance with Chapter 1A-46, Florida Administrative Code.

The City of Tampa reviewed the concept plans that the FDOT provided and in a letter dated October 23, 2003, noted that the proposed improvements to I-75, near the proposed New Tampa Nature Park in the southeast quadrant of the I-75/ CR 581 interchange, would have no impacts on the park site itself. The proposed improvements for I-75 are in compliance with the Management Plan that was developed for the park site.

On November 5, 2003, the FDOT initiated informal consultation with the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) regarding impacts on threatened and endangered species. An Endangered Species Technical Memorandum was prepared for this project. On December 22, 2003, the USFWS indicated "The Proposed action is not likely to adversely affect resources protected by the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et. seq.). This finding fulfills the requirements of the Act."

Copies of these agency letters are provided in Appendix B.

## 5.0 PUBLIC HEARING

A formal Public Hearing was held on December 17, 2003, in the auditorium at the Florida Department of Transportation, District 7 Headquarters, located at 11201 North McKinley Drive in Tampa, Florida. The Hearing was held from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. to present the PD&E Study and Reevaluation and to give the public the opportunity to express their views concerning the conceptual design and social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed improvements. The Study's supporting documents were available for public review prior to and after the Hearing from November 26, 2003 through January 5, 2004 at the New Tampa Regional Library, 10001 Cross Creek Boulevard in Tampa.

Notification was accomplished by electronic mail to public officials and by direct mail to federal, state, regional, and Hillsborough and Pasco Counties agencies, interested citizens, and property owners whose property lies in whole or in part within 300 feet from the centerline of the proposed project.

Legal display advertisements for the Hearing were published on November 27, 2003 and December 11, 2003 in the Metro section of the Tampa Tribune. Forty-four people (not including FDOT staff) signed the attendance rosters.

Copies of the Public Hearing materials, including the legal display advertisement and the newsletter sent to officials, agencies and property owners are included in Appendix C. Copies of the Hearing brochure, recommended build alternative, display graphics, and attendance rosters are included in the Public Hearing Project Scrap Book that was prepared for this project.

The formal portion of the Hearing began at 6:00 p.m. Robert Clifford, AICP, Modal Planning and Development Manager for the FDOT, District 7, presided at the Hearing. Following introductory remarks, Mr. Clifford provided a summary of the FDOT's engineering and environmental studies associated with the proposed improvements and showed a video about the project. The next portion of the Hearing was devoted to oral comments.

Attendees were able to offer statements as part of the Official Public Hearing Record in one of four ways: (1) make an oral statement during the formal portion of the Hearing; (2) make an oral statement to the court reporter during the informal portion of the Hearing; (3) complete the Comment Form and submit it to the court reporter or drop it in the 'Comment Form' box; or (4) complete and mail the Comment Form to the FDOT - District 7.

Three people gave oral statements to the court reporter during the informal portion of the Hearing. One person gave an oral statement during the formal portion of the Hearing. A copy of the Public Hearing transcript is included in Appendix D.

## 6.0 SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS

This section summarizes the substantive comments received throughout the study process. Three oral statements were provided to the court reporter during the informal portion of the Hearing, one oral comment was provided during the formal portion of the Hearing and 86 written comment sheets were received. One written comment form and one oral comment included comments on both noise and some other issue. Thus, 92 comments were received. Copies of the written comments are maintained in the project file. A summary of the oral and written comments received is shown in Table 1.

Approximately 91 percent of the comments concerned noise levels. Most of those commenting are residents within the subdivisions in Tampa Palms. Fifty residents from Tremont Village signed form letters stating they are negatively affected in terms of quality of life by the traffic noise on I-75 and wish to be considered in the noise barrier analysis. Many of these residents also wrote individual comments restating their concerns about noise.

As a result of the PD&E Study's noise analysis, noise barriers have been determined to be cost reasonable at two locations, south of Fowler Avenue on the west side of I-75 and at the Enclave Subdivision of Tampa Palms.

Note: \*One written comment form and one oral comment included comments on more than one issue.

There were 18 requests to be added to the project mailing list and three requests for additional project information. Other miscellaneous comments are summarized below.

**Comment:** One person requested that the FDOT purchase her whole parcel of land for a pond rather than just a strip of this parcel.

**Response:** If the residual portion of the parcel is found to be an uneconomic remainder, the FDOT may purchase the entire parcel.

**Comment:** One person suggested an alternative system of access roads connecting County Line Road and I-275 near the Apex. He also requested the FDOT coordinate with the homeowner's associations in the area.

**Response:** Due to the proximity of the I-275/I-75 Apex area, connections to County Line Road would adversely affect traffic operations on the I-275 and I-75 mainlines. Throughout the Study, the FDOT has conducted a public coordination process. Ongoing coordination will be maintained throughout the design and construction phases of the project.

**Comment:** One person commented on the newly installed natural gas lines in the project area and the effects on these lines due to increased volumes and weight on I-75. He is concerned about any hazardous conditions to the highway and nearby residents. Another concern is the amount of involvement the residents have in the process.

**Response:** The FDOT coordinates transportation improvement projects with utility providers to ensure that neither the roadway nor the utility are adversely affected. Throughout the study, the FDOT has conducted a public coordination process. Ongoing coordination will be maintained throughout the design and construction phases of the project.

## STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ADVANCE NOTIFICATION FACT SHEET

## 1. Need for Project:

The Florida Department of Transportation proposes to improve Interstate 75 (I-75) (State Road 93A) from south of Fowler Avenue to north of State Road 54 (SR 54) in Hillsborough and Pasco Counties, Florida. The project location is shown in Figure 1.

The improvements to I-75 are needed to accommodate projected traffic increases and to improve safety conditions. Improvements to I-75 are consistent with the Hillsborough County, Pasco County and the City of Tampa Comprehensive Plans as well as the Hillsborough County and Pasco County Metropolitan Planning Organization Long-Range Transportation Plans.


## 2. Description of Project:

The existing facility is typically a four-lane limited access highway. The Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study limits extend from south of Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to north of SR 54 in Pasco County, a distance of about 13.9 miles. This Study will evaluate six and eightlane typical section alternatives and a no-build alternative. A PD&E Study Reevaluation of Work Program Item Segment No. 258736 1 will also be undertaken on the I-75 section from south of SR 56, in the vicinity of Cypress Creek, to north of SR 54. The Study will incorporate all recommended improvements being recommended in the ongoing I-75/CR 581 Interchange Modification Report.

#### 3. Environmental Information:

- a. Land Uses: Land uses along the corridor consists of general agriculture, commercial, industrial and low density residential areas. The proposed project is consistent with future land use plans.
- b. Wetlands: Numerous wetlands occur along the project and include riverine, marshes, and forested systems. Some of the wetland areas are high quality, pristine systems with little or no disturbance outside of the existing right-of-way. There are also numerous wetland mitigation sites adjacent to the existing right-of-way. Several of the natural wetlands are large floodplains associated with the riverine systems that cross the project. A Wetland Evaluation Report will be completed for this Study. The evaluation will be coordinated with the Southwest Florida Water Management District, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, US Fish and Wildlife Service, US Environmental Protection Agency, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and local government agencies.
- c. Floodplains: The existing roadway crosses FEMA designated 100-year base floodplains at Cow House Creek, the Hillsborough River and Cypress Creek in Hillsborough County. In Pasco County, portions of the study area for the proposed I-75 widening are located within the 100-year base floodplain at Cypress Creek and Trout Creek. A Location Hydraulic Report and Conceptual Pond and Floodplain Siting Report will be completed for this Study.

Wildlife and Habitat: Preliminary literature reviews have been conducted and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission was contacted regarding known occurrences of protected animals and plants within the study area. During the preliminary field review potential habitat for the following protected animals was noted: Shermans fox squirrel, gopher tortoise, gopher frog, eastern indigo snake, American alligator, Florida sandhill crane, Florida burrowing owl, southeastern kestrel, and numerous species of protected wading birds. Several of these species are known to occur in the area adjacent to I-75. No USFWS-designated Critical Habitat for threatened or endangered species occurs within the Study area. The Florida State Clearinghouse, pursuant to Executive Order 12372, Gubernatorial Executive Order 95-359, the Coastal Zone Management Act, 16 U.S.C. §§ 1451-1464, as amended, and the National Environmental Policy Act, 14 U.S.C. §§ 4321, 4331-4335, 4341-4347, as amended, has coordinated the review of the above-referenced project.

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) indicates that the funding for the Federal Aid action and PD&E study (Interstate 75 From South of Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to North of State Road 54 in Pasco County) is consistent with the DEP's authorities in the Coastal Management Program. The project will require an Environmental Resource Permit issued by the Southwest Florida Water Management District; however, detailed information regarding the project is not yet available and should be provided as soon as it becomes available. In addition, the DEP has provided detailed comments and recommendations for consideration during the development of the project and the PD&E Study. Please refer to the enclosed DEP comments.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has expressed concerns regarding the potential for habitat fragmentation; impacts to wetlands and riparian systems; direct, secondary, and cumulative impacts to the habitat of listed species; the need for supplemental wildlife surveys; and the mitigation of wetland and listed species impact. Therefore, the applicant is encouraged to conduct seasonal wildlife surveys and coordinate with the FWC to minimize impacts to listed species and habitat areas and mitigate any unavoidable impacts. Please refer to the enclosed FWC comments.

The Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council (TBRPC) notes that regionally-significant resources are located within the study area. Therefore, the applicant is encouraged to coordinate with the affected local governments to ensure compliance with all applicable local review or permit requirements. The applicant is encouraged to coordinate with the counties to ensure compliance with the requirements of their comprehensive plans. Please refer to the enclosed TBRPC comments.

Based on the information contained in the referenced Advance Notification and the enclosed comments provided by our reviewing agencies, the state has determined that, at this stage, the referenced project is consistent with the Florida Coastal Management Program (FCMP). However, the applicant is required to address the concerns identified by the DEP, FWC, and TBRPC. All subsequent environmental documents must be reviewed to ensure continued consistency with the FCMP. Therefore, the PD&E study should be forwarded to the State Clearinghouse for interagency review as soon as it becomes available.



## Dear Ms. Raffington:

The Department has reviewed the above referenced Advance Notification from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and Federal Highway Administration (USDOT) to conduct a study of interstate design alternatives to improve safety and accommodate traffic increases on a 13.9-mile section of I-75. Funding for the Federal aid action and PD&E study is consistent with the Department's authorities in the Florida Coastal Management Program. However, as detailed project information is not yet available, the Department cannot determine the consistency of the interstate modification project at this time. Additional information is required concerning the details of anticipated design, width, impacts, construction, and proposed wetland mitigation. Further evaluation(s) of the project will be conducted during the environmental documentation and/or permitting stages. Future consistency will be based in part on adequate consideration of comments offered in this and subsequent reviews. Department staff offer the following comments and recommendations:

- ♦ As noted on the Advance Notification Fact Sheet, interstate construction activities will require issuance of an Environmental Resource Permit (ERP) by the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD), pursuant to Part IV of Chapter 373, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and Rules 62-113, 40D-4, and 40D-40, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.). Please be advised that a sovereign submerged lands authorization(s) (issuance/modification of a public easement) may also be required if the expanded right-of-way crossings of creek and wetland areas are determined to be state-owned submerged lands, per Chapter 253, F.S.
- It is recommended that a binding wetland jurisdictional determination, pursuant to Rule 62-340, F.A.C., be obtained prior to any further planning. Early coordination of project plans with SWFWMD regulatory staff may help prevent future permitting problems.
- ♦ The permit applicant will be required to eliminate or reduce the proposed wetland resource impacts of highway construction to the greatest extent practicable:

"More Protection, Less Process"

- Minimization should emphasize avoidance-oriented corridor alignments; wetland fill reductions via pile bridging and steep (or vertically retained) side slopes; and median width reductions within safety limits.
- Wetlands should not be displaced by the installation of stormwater conveyance and treatment swales; instead, compensatory treatment in adjacent uplands should be considered the preferred alternative.
- After avoidance and minimization have been exhausted, mitigation must be proposed to offset the adverse impacts of the project to existing wetland functions and values. Particular attention should be given to forested wetland systems, which are difficult to mitigate.
- The cumulative impacts of concurrent and future road/interstate improvement projects in the vicinity of the subject project should also be addressed.
- The public conservation and recreation lands located adjacent to the interstate (Cypress Creek Preserve and Lower Hillsborough Flood Detention Area) and in the vicinity of the proposed project (Lettuce Lake Regional Park, Wilderness Park county parks, Ecopalms tract, and Cypress Creek Flood Detention Area) have been targeted for preservation by Hillsborough County, SWFWMD, and the state in order to preserve the area's flatwood, hardwood hammock, swamp, and riverine ecosystems; natural flood detention and stormwater runoff filtering capabilities; recreational opportunities; and significant historical and archaeological sites. The natural areas associated with Cypress Creek, Trout Creek, and the Hillsborough River are also identified as Strategic Habitat Conservation Areas by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission due to high quality ecological communities and occurrences of several listed species. In addition to water resource quality and quantity concerns, the Department is interested in preserving the wildlife corridor functions of these floodplain systems. Therefore, future environmental documentation should include an evaluation of the primary, secondary, and cumulative impacts of highway construction on the above public lands and proposed acquisition sites.
  - Under Article X, Section 18 of the Florida Constitution (as amended in 1998), dispositions of state-owned conservation lands are restricted to those lands "no longer needed for conservation purposes." The FDOT will need to request that the governing board (Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund or SWFWMD Governing Board) holding title to conservation lands within the modified interstate corridor, such as the Lower Hillsborough Flood Detention Area, determine whether the subject parcels are no longer needed for conservation purposes. This new requirement must be met before the conveyance of these lands can proceed. Proposals to utilize state conservation lands are also required to meet the guidelines of the state's linear facility policy, POLICY Use of Natural Resource Lands by Linear Facilities As Approved By Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Trust Fund on January 23, 1996.
  - As the above referenced public lands are heavily used for resource-based recreation, the Department requests that the FDOT evaluate the feasibility of including a trail underpass at the I-75 bridge over the Hillsborough River. Underpass construction would provide New Tampa residents with improved access to recreational lands on the east side of I-75.
  - If there is no reasonable alternative to the expansion of right-of-way within the County's Cypress Creek Preserve, Hillsborough County has requested that the FDOT include the

estimated cost of compensation and/or mitigation for property conveyance in the build alternative.

- ♦ Please be advised: both Cypress Creek and Trout Creek are included within the Hillsborough River Outstanding Florida Waters (OFW) designation under subsection 62-302.700(9)(i)14, F.A.C. Per section 373.414(1), F.S., any impacts to these streams and associated wetlands must be demonstrated to be "clearly in the public interest" as part of the ERP permitting process. Every effort should be made to maximize the treatment of stormwater runoff from the proposed I-75 improvements project, as the Hillsborough River tributaries north of Fletcher Avenue are afforded a high level of protection under sections 62-4.242(2) and 62-302.700, F.A.C. We recommend that the study include an evaluation of existing stormwater treatment adequacy and details on the future stormwater treatment facilities, which must be designed to prevent water quality degradation of the receiving waters in the OFWs. The permit applicant must demonstrate that the proposed stormwater system meets the design and performance criteria established for the treatment/attenuation of discharges to OFWs, pursuant to Rule 40D-4, F.A.C., and the SWFWMD Basis of Review for ERP Applications.
- ♦ Previous surveys of the project area have identified approximately 25-30 archaeological sites, including several eligible for listing on the National Register. We recommend that the proposed Cultural Resources Assessment Survey be conducted by a professional archaeologist and coordinated throughout with the Florida Division of Historical Resources.
- We recommend that future environmental documentation provide information regarding the Best Management Practices to be utilized during construction activities to prevent erosion, sedimentation, and turbid discharges to waters of the state, per Rule 62-302, F.A.C.

We appreciate the opportunity to comment on the Advance Notification and request that copies of the draft Environmental Assessment or Environmental Impact Statement be sent through the State Clearinghouse for review. 

The Office of Environmental Services of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has reviewed the Advance Notification Package for the Project Development & Environment Study for the referenced project, and offers the following comments and recommendations.

The purpose for the study is to evaluate various alternative improvements of I-75, from south of Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to north of SR 54 in Pasco County, that accommodate projected traffic increases and improve safety. Substantial growth of the Tampa metropolitan area into north Hillsborough County and south Pasco County has resulted in severe congestion of area roadways accessing I-75. Many large, established residential communities along with numerous new multi-family, office, commercial, and retail complexes have expanded in this area. This growth trend will continue due to numerous approved Developments of Regional Impact and other major projects planned within the area. In addition to this project, an alternate east/west route with an interchange at I-75 is also under evaluation by a separate PD&E Study.

Currently, a typical four-lane limited access highway extends through the 13.9-mile study area corridor. This study will evaluate typical six- and eight-lane highway alternatives. Although land uses along the corridor consist primarily of agriculture, commercial, industrial, and low-density residential areas, some areas of high quality habitat, including riparian, marsh, and forested wetland areas, are fragmented by the existing highway. Within the study area, the

existing roadway crosses Cow House Creek, the Hillsborough River, Cypress Creek, and Trout Creek.

The following listed species are known, or potentially occur in habitats adjacent to the study area corridor, including: wood stork, Sherman's fox squirrel, Florida mouse, bald eagle, Florida sandhill crane, southeastern American kestrel, listed wading birds, eastern indigo snake, gopher frog, gopher tortoise, and American alligator.

FWC concerns include: further fragmentation of wildlife habitat; impacts to wetland and riparian systems; direct, secondary, and cumulative impacts to listed species; the need for supplemental wildlife surveys; and adequate mitigation for wetland and listed species habitat impacts. The selected project alignment should avoid impacts to listed species. Seasonal and pre-construction surveys should be conducted to document the presence or absence of listed species and assess impacts. Any impacts to active nests of listed species should only occur upon FWC authorization or permit, and adequate mitigation. To compensate for impacts to wetlands and listed species habitat, we support mitigation that establishes or maintains habitat connectivity within the study area and adjacent natural areas.

Although extensive fragmentation of wildlife habitat has resulted from construction of the existing roadway, proposed improvements may provide opportunities to re-connect core habitats and enhance potential greenways/corridors in this area. Suitable wildlife undercrossings should be incorporated with appropriate bridge designs at the Hillsborough River, Cypress Creek, Trout Creek, and Cow House Creek wetland crossings. To insure functionality, wildlife undercrossing design parameters must be adequate for the expansive roadway crossing at these major wetlands.

We recommend coordination with the Hillsborough River Greenways Task Force for locating the proposed roadway improvements, locating potential mitigation opportunities within greenways/corridors, and minimizing impacts to the Hillsborough River basin.



The Florida State Clearinghouse has requested review and comment on the regional issues which should be addressed in the Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study for potential expansion of the titled roadway to six or eight lanes. The Study Area is located in central northern Hillsborough County and central southern Pasco County. Approximately 13.9 miles of roadway are included. A reevaluation of the Work Program for the segment between SR 56 to north of SR 54 will also be undertaken, and the recommendations from the I-75/CR 581 Interchange Modification Report will be included.

## Council Comments/Concerns

The project may impact Natural Resources of Regional Significance" as identified in Future of the Region: A Strategic Regional Policy Plan for the Tampa Bay Region (FRSRPP). The attached map illustrates the regionally-significant resources that have been identified in the Study Area. Additional regionally-significant resources may be identified during the Study, including Designated wetlands, Strategic Habitat Conservation Areas, Priority Wetlands for Species (7+), and Rare/Endangered Species Occurrences. Pursuant to SRPP Policies 4.5.2 and 4.5.6, it must be determined that any proposed impacts to regionally-significant natural resources are of overriding public interest, and mitigation should be required according to the ratios set forth therein.

Further, it is recommended that any additional comments addressing local concerns be considered.

Pertinent policies from the Council's adopted policy plan, Future of the Region: A Strategic Regional Policy Plan for the Tampa Bay Region, include:



- 4.5.3: Mitigation by habitat re-creation shall employ native plant material which replaces natural value and function. Monitor mitigation areas for a sufficient time to ensure success: a minimum 85 percent final coverage of desired species. Yearly maintenance and replanting should be undertaken to ensure final cover as necessary.
- 4.5.5: Mitigation for allowable impacts to regionally-significant wetland areas should be performed within the drainage basin.
- 4.5.6: Mitigation by restoring disturbed habitat of a similar nature, including the removal of exotic plant species, may be acceptable. The minimum acceptable ratio shall be twice the habitat re-creation ratio set forth in policy 4.5.2.
- 4.5.7: Maintain and improve native plant communities and viable wildlife habitats, determined to be regionally-significant natural resources in addition to the Map of Regionally-Significant Natural Resources, including those native habitats and plant communities that tend to be least in abundance and most productive or unique.
- 4.5.10: Maintain a minimum horizontal buffer necessary to preserve the natural value and function of the regionally-significant natural resource.

Regional Goal 4.11: Incorporate the protection of regionally-significant natural resources in planning for future growth in the region.

4.11.6: Land use decisions shall be consistent with federal- and state-listed species protection and recovery plans, and adopted habitat management guidelines.







Our office received the referenced project in accordance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (Public Law 89-665), as amended in 1992, and 36 C.F.R., Part 800: Protection of Historic Properties. The State Historic Preservation Officer is to advise and assist federal agencies when identifying historic properties listed or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places, assessing effects upon them, and considering alternatives to avoid or minimize adverse effects.

The investigation of the PD&E Study project Area of Potential Effect, including the existing and proposed rights-of-way as well as the proposed pond sites and Flood Plain Compensation sites, resulted in the identification and evaluation of one newly recorded site, 28 previously recorded archaeological sites, one archaeological occurrence, and two historical structures.

The newly recorded site, 8HI7877 is a small lithic scatter. It is the opinion of Archaeological Consultants, Inc. (ACI), that due to the paucity of temporally diagnostic artifacts and the sparse assemblage, site 8H17877 does not meet the criteria for listing in the National Register of Illstoric Places. Based on the information provided, our office concurs with this determination. We further note that, since the tests were excavated near the corners of the proposed pond site, it is probable that the site area extends outside the boundaries of this proposed facility. We recommend additional testing, in case project plans change to include any area outside of site 8HI7877 as identified in the present investigation.

The location of 15 previously recorded sites could not be verified by this investigation, including site 8111450 that was considered eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

The locations of 13 other previously recorded sites were verified and updated Florida Master Site File (FMSF) has been provided. These include 8HI10, 8HI99, 8HI471, 8HI472, 8HI473, 8HI483, 8HI5431, 8HI5432, 8PA357, 8PA480, 8PA481, 8PA632, and 8PA633.

Of the total 28 previously recorded archaeological sites, six sites (8HI99, 8HI450, 8HI471, 8HI472, 8HI473, and 8HI483) were considered potentially eligible for listing in the *National Register of Historic Places* in 1979.

The Florida SHPO subsequently considered 8III99 inelgible for the National Register of Historic Places in 1994. Archaeological testing of 8HI99, as contained within the referenced project area, indicated an absence of significant cultural material and hence, it is the opinion of ACI that site 8III99 does not appear to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Based on the information provided, our office concurs with this determination.

While 8HI450 was considered eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places in 1979, the current investigations could not locate the site. No significant information was derived from the present investigation of sites 8HI471 and 8HI472 and it is the opinion of ACI, that both sites have suffered damage as a result of the construction of 1-75, and no significant archaeological deposits associated with site 8HI471 and 8HI472 are contained within the project API. Based on the information provided, our office concurs with this determination.

The archaeological occurrence (AO #1) was identified by a single flake and did not appear to meet the minimum criteria for listing as an archaeological site.

The two historic structures 8H17839 and 8H17840 are Frame Vernacular Style residences representing commonly occurring types of local architecture. Due to common design, non-historic alterations, and lack of known significant historical associations, it is the opinion of ACI that these structures do not appear to meet the criteria for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Based on the information provided, our office concurs with this determination. It is the opinion of ACI that the proposed developmental plans will have no effect on properties of historical or archaeological value. Based on the information provided, our office concurs with this determination.

We find the submitted report complete but insufficient in accordance with Chapter 1A-46, Florida Administrative Code. The requested information should be identified as an addendum to the referenced report, and include the above DHR Number (2003-8830). The report will be considered sufficient on receipt of the following information.

• Information regarding site 8HI473 and site 8HI483 is disparate in the project report (page 6-19, 6-23) and on the FMSF site forms - please clarify.



The Florida Department of Transportation is conducting a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study to address proposed improvements on I-75 within the limits noted above. This study will evaluate improving the existing four-lane limited access facility to a six-lane typical section and six-lane typical section with auxiliary lanes to satisfy the future projected traffic demands. The vast majority of the proposed improvements will occur within the existing right-of-way. Right-of-way may be required for ramp extensions and the auxiliary lanes between the I-275/I-75 apex and SR 56. The bridges spanning the Hillsborough River and the two Cypress Creek crossings will be widened to accommodate the additional lanes not replaced or reconstructed.

As part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) the Department is initiating informal consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. A *Threatened and Endangered Species Memorandum* has been prepared for your agency's review. In order to fulfill the requirements of the NEPA process, the Department solicits comments from federal, state, and local agencies. All comments received by the Department will be addressed in the support documents and made available at the public hearing during the public involvement phase.

This proposed project has been evaluated for impacts on federally protected threatened and endangered species. Based on the results of the literature review and field surveys conducted, the Department has concluded that no federally listed threatened or endangered species will be affected by the proposed improvements. Furthermore, the proposed project is not located in an area designated as Critical Habitat by the U.S. Department of Interior. Therefore, the Department on behalf of the Federal Highway Administration has determined that the proposed actions will have "No Effect" with any federally protected threatened or endangered species.





### **EXISTING 1-75**

Within the project limits I-75 generally has four 12-foot travel lanes (two in each direction), 8-foot inside shoulders, 10-foot or 12-foot outside shoulders, separated by a median that varies from 64 feet to 112 feet wide. In addition, there are auxiliary lanes in various locations. The existing typical section is shown in Figure 2.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The FDOT is conducting a PD&E Study for improvements to I-75 from Fowler Avenue to south of SR 56. The FDOT is also conducting a Reevaluation Study from south of SR




56 to CR 54 in Hillsborough and Pasco Counties. The original PD&E Study evaluated adding two lanes (one lane in each direction) to the existing roadway and was approved by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) on November 27, 2000. For the analysis, the project was divided into six segments. Segments A, B, C, D and a portion of E are within the PD&E Study limits. The remaining portion of Segment E and Segment F make up the Reevaluation Study limits. The project study limits and the segments are shown in Figure 1.



### Recommended "Build" Alternative

In general, the Recommended "Build" Alternative would add at least one additional lane in each direction for the length of the project and, in all segments except Segment D, auxiliary lanes would be provided. An auxiliary lane is a full width travel lane adjacent to the mainline to allow for safe speed changes and merging at entrance and exit ramps. The typical section varies throughout the project segments. Figures 3, 4 and 5 depict the typical sections proposed along the project corridor.

In Segments A, B, C and F the typical section would have three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, one 12-foot auxiliary lane in each direction and 12-foot inside and outside shoulders, of which 10 feet are paved. The proposed typical section is shown in Figure 3.

In Segment D, the typical section would consist of three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, 12-foot inside and outside shoulders, of which 10 feet are paved and a 64-foot median. The proposed typical section is shown in Figure 4.

The typical section for Segment E would consist of three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, three 12-foot auxiliary lanes in the southbound direction, one 12-foot auxiliary lane in the northbound direction, 12-foot shoulders, of which 10 feet are paved and a 64-foot median. A two-lane ramp would run parallel to the mainline. This proposed typical section is shown in Figure 5.

## No-Build Alternative

The No-Build Alternative represents leaving I-75 in its existing condition while allowing for routine maintenance. The No-Build Alternative will remain a viable alternative throughout the study process.

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

### **PROJECT NEED**

Traffic demand along I-75 from Fowler Avenue to CR 54 has increased in recent years. Several segments of I-75 and its ramps are currently experiencing Level of Service F in the peak hours. Forecasts indicate further traffic increases due to development in northern Hillsborough and southern Pasco Counties. The Traffic Technical Memorandum prepared for his project recommends that I-75 be widened to six lanes to provide additional capacity throughout the study limits.






### ORAL STATEMENTS

My name is Harvey Alkow, A-L-K-O-W. I live at 7205 Wareham Drive, Tampa Palms. I am in the Tremont section of Tampa Palms. I live in a conservation area and I am not near your sound criteria area, but I still hear the roar of the traffic in the morning.

I'm here representing the Tremont people who live close to I-75 who are hearing all kinds of roar, and now you're adding another lane to I-75; the roar is going to be worse.

According to the federal study, you are not allowed to build or cannot build a sound barrier until the sound decibels reach 6 and above. We're at 5.7 and 5.8, now you're adding another lane.

If you live near this I-75 area and you come out in the morning, you can't tell the difference between a decibel of 6 and 5.7 or 5.8. It's infinitesimal. The roar is unbelievable, and now you're adding more traffic to it.

So I would suggest that before you have an uprising of the people living in the Tremont area that you reconsider putting up some kind of a sound barrier at 275, particularly covering

the Tremont area going all -- and the Onclave area going all the way past the new development, Buckingham.

I don't want to talk about anybody else's homes but there are homes in the area that are anywhere from half a million to two and a half million near the park which is right on 275, and nothing is done for them.

I would hate -- I would hate to have to live with the worst sound when you're building a half-a-million-dollar-and-up house.

That's it.

I'm Ralph Lehman. I live in Tremont,

Tampa Palms. And the comment I would like to

make is that I have a great concern.

At this point where I live, which is a fair distance from the -- from 75, there's still a lot of noise. And in the winter in particular when there's no humidity in the air, the noise carries a great deal further so that you can't even open your windows in the fall -- or towards the wintertime, because the noise comes in whenever there's traffic on 75, and that includes Sunday mornings as well.

This is going to increase when we have this additional amount of traffic by the growth that's occurring to the north of us, then the increase in the lane on 75.

That's really going to have an effect on what I consider my standard of living and why I bought where I did when I did. So I really object to having this built without some sound barriers being put up.

It's been made clear to me that the level of sounds that enters even within the area that measure -- and they don't measure back where we live -- and I understand some of the sound

carries up over the area close by to where we live in a way that doesn't really reflect what you might expect, but is louder.

The problem is that as far as I understand, even within the area close to 75 where they measured the sound level was above the accepted federal limit. And furthermore, the measurement was made in the summer, and while there are corrections for the winter these are based on national standards; I think that with the humidity we experience in the summer, which reflects sound and the change in the winter that we are different than the national standard that's being imposed on us. I think that there is a greater amount of sound in the winter than is being taken into account.

The main problem is that even in the summer they measured a level above what's acceptable by federal standards, and the only reason that they're not going to put this up is a cost basis.

Well, I find this difficult because it's going to cost a great deal to us in terms of property values and our standard of living, and I would like to make it clear that I object to

Welcome to the I-75 Project Development and Environment Study and Reevaluation Public Hearing. This public hearing concerns the proposed improvements on I-75 from Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to County Road 54 in Pasco County.

Today is Wednesday, December 17th, 2003, and it is approximately 6 p.m.

This is your opportunity to receive information on the project and to publicly and officially comment on the Recommended Build Alternative and other documents available here tonight. The Recommended Build Alternative is based on environmental and engineering analyses accomplished to date as well as public comments received.

This project development and environment or PD&E study and reevaluation, along with the public hearing are conducted under applicable federal and state laws. Those citations, along

with the advertisement dates, are listed on the board next to the sign-in table.

When you arrived this evening you should have received a handout and matrix containing information concerning the project and a comment sheet. If you did not receive this information, please raise your hand and we will provide them to you. Anybody who hasn't received that information?

At this time I would like to introduce representatives that may assist you in answering any questions regarding the materials or displays that we have here this evening.

First, I would like to introduce Mike
Seifert, our Project Manager for the project;
Kirk Bogen, our District Project Development
Engineer; John Romero, our Consultant Project
Manager; and Kristen Carson, of our District
Public Information Office.

I will now show a video presentation that describes the project need, evaluation process, and proposed alternatives. After the video you will be given an opportunity to make an oral statement during this formal portion.

## VIDEO PRESENTATION

"Welcome to the Florida Department of
Transportation's Public Hearing for the proposed
improvements to Interstate 75 in Hillsborough
and Pasco Counties.

"The hearing will present information about the project development and environment, or PD&E study, for I-75 from south of Fowler Avenue in Hillsborough County to south of State Road 56 in Pasco County, and the reevaluation study from south of State Road 56 to County Road 54 in Pasco County.

"The project length is approximately 13.9 miles. The intent of this PD&E study is to evaluate and document the engineering and environmental issues associated with the proposed improvements to I-75.

"The public hearing is being conducted by the Florida Department of Transportation in cooperation with the Federal Highway

Administration. The hearing provides interested citizens an opportunity to ask questions and offer comments about the proposed improvements.

"The Department has distributed

information about this project and has solicited input regarding the values and desires of the local community through presentations to various local organizations and public officials.

"I-75 is functionally classified as an urban principal arterial interstate from Fowler Avenue to south of Bruce B. Downs Boulevard, and a rural principal arterial interstate from south of Bruce B. Downs Boulevard to County Road 54.

"Within the project limits, I-75 is typically a four-lane facility with 8-foot inside shoulders of which 4 feet are paved, and 12-foot outside shoulders of which 10 feet are paved. The existing I-75 right of way is typically 324 feet wide in Hillsborough County and is generally 300 feet wide in Pasco County.

"The need for this project has been identified in the Hillsborough and Pasco Counties' Metropolitan Planning Organizations 2025 Long Range Transportation Plans.

"Improvements to I-75 are needed to accommodate anticipated traffic growth.

According to the study's traffic analysis, I-75 currently carries up to 96,400 vehicles per

day. By the year 2028, I-75 is projected to carry up to 153,000 vehicles per day. This represents more than a 58 percent increase over the current traffic volumes.

"The recommended alternative proposed for I-75 consists of adding at least one lane in each direction for the length of the project.

The typical section would consist of three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, 12-foot inside and outside shoulders, and a median with a minimum width of 64 feet including the shoulders. In some segments auxiliary lanes would also be added.

"In Segments A, B, C and F the typical section would have three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, one 12-foot auxiliary lane in each direction, and 12-foot inside and outside shoulders of which 10 feet are paved.

"In Segment D the typical section would consist of three 12-foot travel lanes in each direction, 12-foot inside and outside shoulders of which 10 feet are paved, and a 64-foot median including the shoulders.

"The typical section for Segment E would consist of three 12-foot travel lanes in each

direction, three 12-foot auxiliary lanes in the southbound direction, one 12-foot auxiliary lane in the northbound direction, 12-foot shoulders of which 10 feet are paved, and a 64-foot median including the shoulders. A two-lane ramp would run parallel to the mainline.

"Proposed improvements to the I-275 apex would include the replacement of the existing two-lane I-275 northbound bridge over I-75 with a longer bridge that would provide two through lanes on I-275 and a single lane off-ramp to State Road 56. The off-ramp to State Road 56 from I-275 would begin before the I-275 bridge and run along I-275 and then extend parallel to the I-75 mainline up to State Road 56.

"An exit ramp from I-75 to State Road 56 would begin south of the I-275 overpass bridge and join with the I-275 ramp before passing under the County Line Road bridge. The two-lane ramp would run parallel to the I-75 mainline up to State Road 56. Beginning the ramp south of the merge of I-75 and I-275 would eliminate the weaving between I-275 traffic wanting to proceed northbound on I-75 and I-75 northbound traffic wishing to exit at State Road 56.

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"Preliminary concept plans showing the recommended alternative and the locations and number of auxiliary lanes are on display here tonight.

"This project has been coordinated with the Federal Highway Administration approved Bruce B. Downs Boulevard PD&E Study and Interchange Modification Report and the City of Tampa's New Tampa Boulevard Overpass.

"An important component of this study is the comparative evaluation of the environmental effects associated with each alternative. The evaluations were conducted in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act and other federal requirements. They include consideration of the project's effects on the social, cultural, natural and physical environment.

"The major parameters upon which the Recommended Build Alternative and the No-Build Alternative were evaluated are presented in the matrix contained in the project brochure and are on display here tonight.

"Among the factors evaluated in the study are:

"For the segment from Bruce B. Downs to the I-275 apex, Design is funded in fiscal year 2004/2005; Right of way is funded in fiscal year 2006/2007; and Construction is not currently funded.

"For the segment from south of the I-275 apex to County Road 54, Design is funded for fiscal year 2004/2005; Right of way and

"This hearing is one of your opportunities to comment on the study and the recommended alternative. Your comments are very important. If you would like to make a comment as part of public hearing record, you may comment in one of the following four ways:

"First, you can complete one of the speaker cards in order to make an oral statement during the formal portion of the hearing.

"Second, you can make an oral statement to the court reporter here tonight in a one-on-one setting during the informal portion of the hearing.

"Third, you can complete the comment form provided in the brochure or located on the comment tables and submit it to the court reporter or drop it in one of the comment boxes.

"Fourth, you can complete and mail written comments to the address listed on the comment form.

"All submittals must be postmarked by January 5th, 2003 (sic) to become part of the official public hearing record. All comments,

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regardless of how they are submitted, will be considered equally before a recommendation is made to the Federal Highway Administration.

"This concludes the presentation. The Department thanks you for participating in the hearing and for your interest in the I-75 PD&E Study in Hillsborough and Pasco Counties."

MR. CLIFFORD: Turn the lights up. One additional clarification I wish to make that's different than what you just saw on the video and in the handout, we do have it on the board here, is in our new tentative work program.

The piece of I-75 from Bruce B. Downs to the I-275 apex, we're proposing to have fully funded in the work program and fiscal year of 08/09. That's a recent addition that's different than the information presented on the video and in your handout. It is on the board over here.

As the video describes, you may provide your comments by giving an oral statement to the court reporter in a one-on-one setting during the informal portion of the hearing.

For those of you who prefer to provide written comments, you may complete the comment

form included in your handout that can be submitted to the court reporter, dropped in one of the comment boxes, or mailed to us at the preprinted address.

To be included as part of the official public hearing document, again, all letters and correspondence need to be postmarked no later than January 5, 2004.

You may also provide your comments during this portion of the public hearing. Please complete a speaker card, and I'll call your name in which the order they are received.

Is there anybody that has completed such a card and wishes to speak during the formal portion? Mr. Davison. Thank you.

Just to remind everyone, this is not a question and answer session. It is the formal portion within the hearing. Mr. Davison, go ahead.

MR. DAVISON: Bob, I appreciate you having us today. Actually, looking at the proposed expansion is very interesting for a couple of things.

Number one, I don't think anyone realized what the State had planned for that section

between the apex and State Road 56 where you're going to be putting in a two-lane road going north off of I-275 into State Road 56, and then you'll have three auxiliary lanes going south from 56 down to I-275.

The reason that intrigues me is that the east/west road, which you're familiar with -- one of the reasons that that was not -- I think it was Section C -- or Segment C -- Alternative C was that there were environmental concerns.

You seem to have bridged those environmental concerns by sticking that two-lane road in there.

When you come to put that road in there, you get together with the County, Pasco, Hillsborough County and the City of Tampa, and see if there would be any way that you could access one way going north onto that two-lane road off of County Line Road and a one-way lane going south accessing I-275 going south, which would be kind of a hybrid of the Alternative C.

The reason that's important is that may only negate having to have a two-lane road being financed by the City of Tampa through West

Meadows and into the I-275 interchange from the

east/west road and may also only have to make
Bruce B. Downs six lanes all the way through
with those two improvements. That would be a
savings of approximately 70 million dollars, and
not to mention the aesthetics that it would
provide to that community.

And I would urge you and the City and the MPO to get together to see if that would be a viable alternative.

And Number Two, I would urge you to sit down with the homeowners of the Tampa Palms area -- sit down and explain to them about the noise levels.

I can tell you for a fact that I did not buy a house in the River Estates section of Tampa Palms because of the current noise levels.

Now, I understand there are some engineering constraints, but with certain foliage on the other side of the pond, discussing rights of way with the Tampa Palms Homeowners Association, you may be able to, if not eliminate, partially negate some of that sound problem that they're going to be having. I'm sure that they would be very amenable to

sitting down with you, the homeowners associations, and looking at some of those alternatives. Thank you very much.

MR. CLIFFORD: Thank you. Is there anybody else who wishes to comment during this formal portion? Anybody else? Okay. Seeing none.

At this point what I'll do is I'll go ahead and close the hearing. Some final statements I need to read into the record.

The public hearing transcript, written statements, exhibits and reference materials will be available for public inspection at the District 7 office, 11201 North McKinley Drive, Tampa, Florida, within three weeks.

It is approximately 6:25. I hereby officially close the formal portion of the public hearing of the I-75 PD&E Study.
